Dance delights pupils

SPRINGFIELD - Springfield public school pupils screamed with delight at a performance yesterday by the Alvin Ailey II Dance Compa-

"That's what I want to do when I grow up," said Aisha D. Gullet. 11, a fifth-grader at the William N. DeBerry School. Aisha was one of about 30 pupils who volunteered to go on stage to follow a professional choreographer's moves.

The 12-member dance company, which did a mix of new pieces and Ailey classics at CityStage, is on a 43-city national tour that began Sept. 6. Sponsors of yesterday's event included MassMutual and Baystate Medical Center.

Ailey, a world-renowned choreographer who died in 1989 at 58, is seen as a major contributor to modern dance for his fusion of classical ballet with jazz and ancient forms.

He founded the Alvin Ailey Dance Theater, which continues operation in New York City under the direction of Judith Jamison, and the Alvin Ailey II Dance Company, created by Ailey in 1974 as a repertory ensemble. Ailey II does critical thinking skills. extensive community out-

"We have a school in New York City where we train all our dancers, we start them out at the age of 2," said Troy Powell, Ailey II's associate artistic director.
