ATLANTA – (Jan. 17, 2012) – <u>Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater</u>, recognized by U.S. Congress as a vital American "Cultural Ambassador to the World," returns to the Fabulous Fox Theatre February 16th to 19th for the inaugural Atlanta engagement led by dynamic new Artistic Director Robert Battle. Following critically-acclaimed sold out performances in New York City, Ailey's extraordinary dancers will move Atlanta audiences with premieres that launch an exciting new era in Ailey history.

"I am so proud to have the opportunity to build upon the inspiring legacy of Alvin Ailey and Judith Jamison as we begin a new chapter in our long relationship with the people of Atlanta," said <u>Robert Battle</u>. "I can't wait for audiences at the Fox to join me in experiencing the world's most amazing dancers in this season's premieres, as we take the next step in an electrifying journey together."

The 2012 Atlanta engagement will showcase the brilliant artistry and passionate spirit of the Company's dancers in innovative premieres, repertory favorites, and Ailey classics. In addition to Alvin Ailey's inspiring must-see <u>Revelations</u>, each performance will include: <u>Takademe</u>, a high-flying and humorous solo that was one of Robert Battle's first creations; and <u>Home</u>, a bold new work by hiphop choreographer Rennie Harris set to a soul-lifting score of gospel house music. <u>Home</u> is inspired by ten winning photos and essays submitted to

the "Fight HIV Your Way" contest, an initiative of Bristol-Myers Squibb. Atlanta area residents <u>James R. Dustin</u> and <u>Sherry Meltz</u> were among the winners.

Paul Taylor's romantic <u>Arden Court</u>, the first work by this American modern dance master to enter the Ailey repertory, will be performed on Thursday's Opening Night, as well as on Saturday evening and Sunday matinee programs. On Friday evening and Saturday matinee programs, there will be performances of an audience favorite - Robert Battle's <u>The Hunt</u>, an athletic tour-de-force for six men to a thundering percussion soundtrack.

REPERTORY FOR ATLANTA ENGAGEMENT

World Premiere

Home (2011) choreographed by Rennie Harris

Hip-hop choreographer Rennie Harris, who worked alongside Judith Jamison and Robert Battle to create *Love Stories* for the company in 2004, is choreographing a new work inspired by the stories, poems and images submitted to the *Fight HIV Your Way* contest, an initiative of Bristol-Myers Squibb. Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater presented the premiere of the work on World AIDS Day (December 1) at New York City Center. **Robert Battle comments:** "I think Rennie is great in the way he takes a conceptual approach to hip-hop. He is bringing a unique perspective to stories that absolutely have to be told, and that ought to be realized in a dance vocabulary that comes from a new generation."

Company Premieres

Arden Court (1981) choreographed by Paul Taylor

Modern dance master Paul Taylor supervised the staging of this technically challenging work (rarely performed by companies other than his own) on the Ailey company, the first of his works to enter the Ailey repertory. Set to a sumptuous baroque score by William Boyce, *Arden Court* is a richly dynamic dance featuring striking duets, solos and a men's sextet showcasing the dancers' skills and musicality. Mr. Taylor is one of the artistic inspirations for Robert Battle, whose choreography often reflects the expansive use of space that is a hallmark of Mr. Taylor's work. Robert Battle comments: "We are celebrating a lineage by adding *Arden Court* to the repertory since Paul came out of Martha Graham's company, and Alvin was so influenced by Martha Graham. Alvin was also a fan of Paul's work, and the two of them started their companies at about the same time. It is important that we honor this American modern dance tradition—and *Arden Court* gives us the opportunity to explore the physicality of the dancers in a very different way."

Takademe (1999) choreographed by Robert Battle

For his first season as Artistic Director, Mr. Battle is bringing his fiery *Takademe* to the Ailey Company. The complex, tightly woven rhythms of Indian Kathak dance are deconstructed and abstracted in this percussive, fast-paced work, where clear shapes and propulsive jumps mimic the vocalized rhythmic syllables of Sheila Chandra's jazzy score. **Robert Battle comments:** "*Takademe* is near and dear to me as one of my first creations. It's a work I made in the tiny living room of my old apartment in Queens. As I begin as Artistic Director, I want to acknowledge my journey, look back on what I did with so little and recognize having so very much now. Also, the

work has a sense of humor, and some of my other works that have been done at Ailey were in a more serious vein. I wanted to share another aspect of myself with the Ailey audience."

Ailey Classics and Repertory Favorites

Night Creature (1975) choreographed by Alvin Ailey

One of Ailey's most classically choreographed ballets; *Night Creature* depicts a series of sexy nocturnal rituals that propel the movement toward a fast-paced, cathartic climax. Night Creature is the definitive Ailey homage to the exuberance of Duke Ellington's jazz.

The Hunt (2011) choreographed by Robert Battle

In *The* Hunt, an athletic work for six men by artistic director Robert Battle, reveals the predatory side of human nature and the primitive thrill of the hunt. A thundering percussion soundtrack by Les Tambours du Bronx drives the explosive movement that runs the gamut from modern sports to the rituals of the gladiators. This is Mr. Battle's sixth work for Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.

Revelations (1951) choreographed by Alvin Ailey

Using African-American spirituals, song-sermons, gospel songs and holy blues, *Revelations* fervently explores the places of deepest grief and holiest joy in the soul. Alvin Ailey said that one of America's richest treasures was the cultural heritage of the African-American -"sometimes sorrowful, sometimes jubilant, but always hopeful." This enduring classic is a tribute to that heritage and to Ailey's genius.

ABOUT ALVIN AILEY AMERICAN DANCE THEATER

Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, recognized by U.S. Congressional resolution as a vital American "Cultural Ambassador to the World," grew from a now-fabled March 1958 performance in New York that changed forever the perception of American dance. Founded by Alvin Ailey, and guided by Judith Jamison beginning in 1989, the Company is now led by Robert Battle, whom Judith Jamison chose to succeed her on July 1, 2011. Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater has performed for an estimated 23 million people in 71 countries on 6 continents, promoting the uniqueness of the African-American cultural experience and the preservation and enrichment of the American modern dance tradition. In addition to being the Principal Dance Company of New York City Center, where its performances have become a year-end tradition, the Ailey company performs annually at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC, the Auditorium Theatre in Chicago, the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts of Miami-Dade County in Miami, The Fox Theatre in Atlanta, Zellerbach Hall in Berkeley, CA and at the New Jersey Performing Arts Center in Newark where it is the Principal Resident Affiliate), and appears frequently in other major theaters throughout the United States and the world during extensive yearly tours. The Ailey organization also includes Ailey II (1974), a second performing company of emerging young dancers and innovative choreographers; The Ailey School (1969), one of the most extensive dance training programs in the world; Ailey Arts in Education & Community Programs, which brings dance into the classrooms, communities and lives of people of all ages; and The Ailey Extension (2005), a program offering dance and fitness classes to the general public, which began with the opening of Ailey's permanent home—the largest building dedicated to dance in New York City, the dance capital of the world —named The Joan Weill Center for Dance, at 55th Street at 9th Avenue in New York City.
